ONCE UPON A TIME.....That's the way the "Shirley Swanson Story" should begin, for in most respects it's an American fairy tale.

Muskegon's auburn-haired Shirley-- at 19 the reigning Miss Michigan-- saw her dream come true on warm June evening. It was the same dream that dwells in the heart of every American girl-- to someday win an acclaim for beauty and talent.

The first Muskegon girl ever to rule as queen of Michigan, Shirley now probably is the city's busiest citizen. Ahead is a whirling schedule of appearances and preparations in advance of Sept. 1, when she'll leave to compete in the Miss America pageant in Atlantic City. There for one fabulous week, she'll match her beauty and talent, her poise and personality against queens from every other state and Hawaii. Finally, on Sept. 8, she with all the other beauties, will be present when the new Miss America is crowned before a national television audience.

These are hectic days, too, for Shirley's parents, Mr. And Mrs. Gust Swanson, her sister, and three brothers....and for Citizens group-- the chaperones, coaches and all the others who are working to give Shirley every opportunity in the Miss American contest.

With entry deadline not far off, committee members from Women's Division, Chamber of Commerce who are making arrangements for the Miss Muskegon pageant May 29, were emphasizing today the difference between the modern beauty contest and the common notion of a bathing beauty con-

testant seeking a girl for the title "Miss Muskegon." judges will be considering many qualities other than a lovely face and figure.

As a matter of fact, girls appear just once in their swim suits in this portion of the judging which represents only one-quarter of the total points.

Rooming, poise and personality of contestants will be prime consideration of judges when they meet. Contestants attend a buffet dinner preceding the pageant at Michigan Theatre.

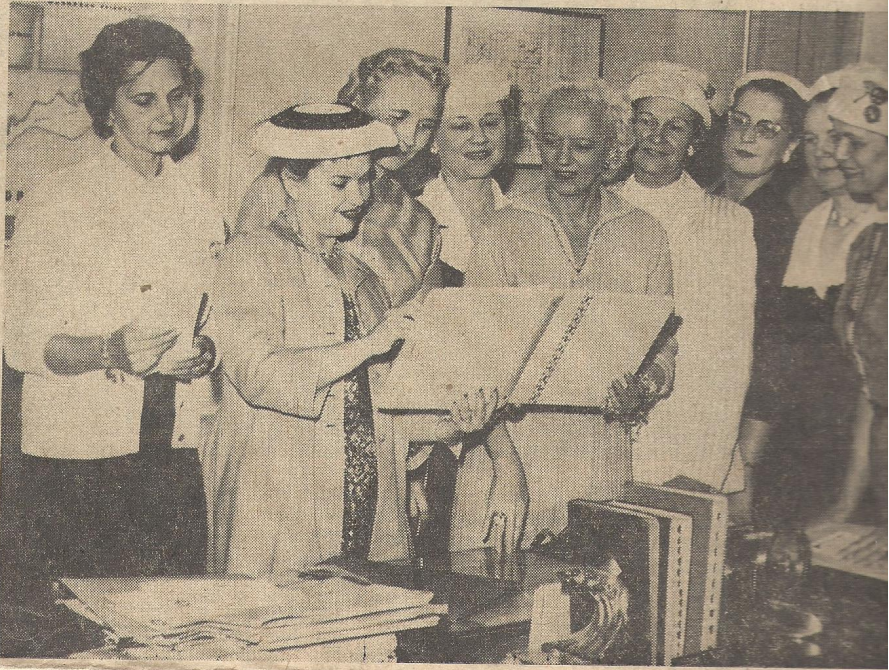
When the girls are introduced to the audience for the first time in their evening gowns, their carriage and stage personality will determine the number of votes they receive.

It is generally conceded that a beauty contestant with a well-rounded personality has many interests and performs at least one accomplishment. This is demonstrated in the talent portion of the pageant. Some contestants may sing, dance, or play a musical instrument; others are talented in the art field or demonstrate typing ability; still others will effectively present themselves on their chosen careers. This portion of the judging is based on proficiency of presentation.

The last phase of the pageant is swim suit presentation. It is at this time that the contestant's personality and figure are taken into consideration.

The Miss Muskegon Pageant is conducted according to rules of the America Pageant. Judges are looking for a fresh, natural beauty, a girl with genuine personal charm to compete in the Michigan Pageant and to represent Greater Muskegon throughout the coming year.

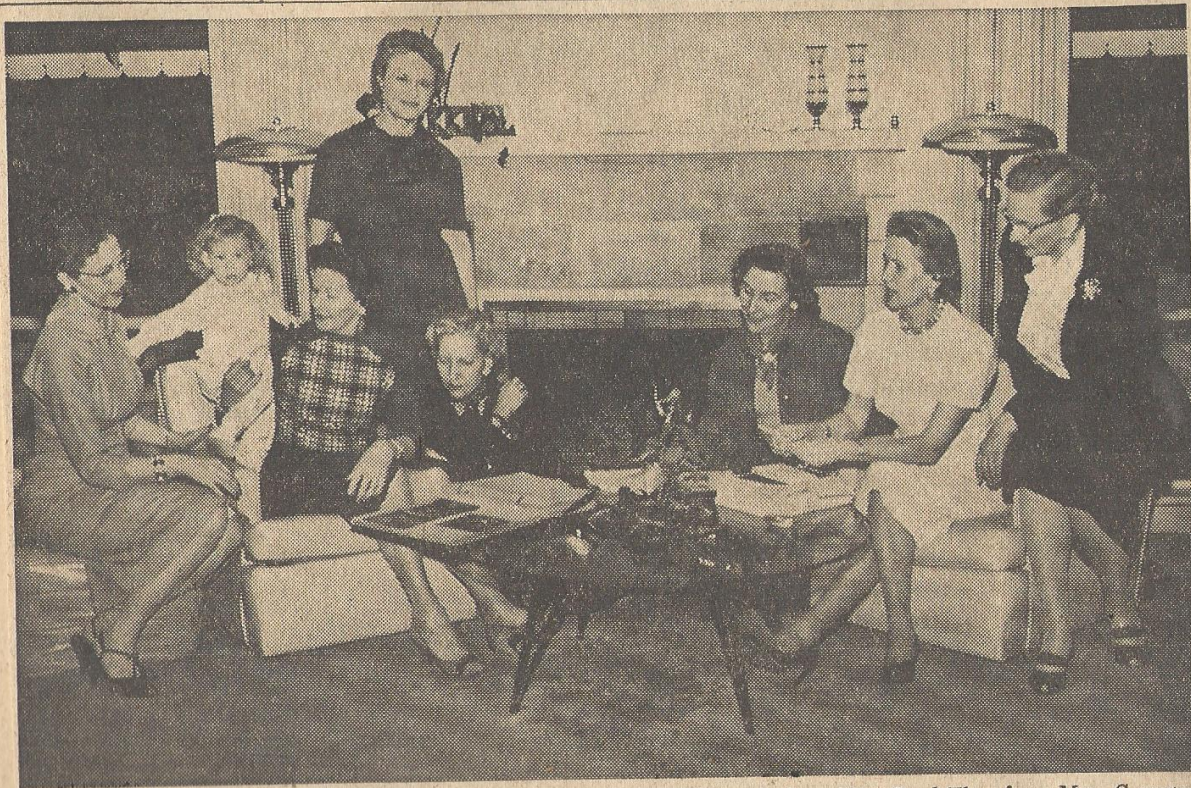

She appeared at a recent convention for Junior College teachers in Grand Rapids, playing accompaniment for a choir composed of students from Junior Colleges from all over Michigan.

The new "Miss" laughingly admitted that although her brothers and sisters didn't take music too seriously, "they were sure impressed last night." Mary plans to use her \$250 Coca-Cola scholarship to further her musical education.

Mrs. L. C. DenHollander and Mrs. G. W. Hansen were co-chairmen of the event.



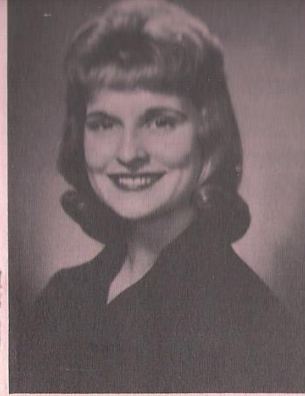

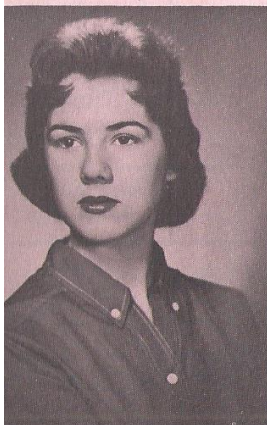

Pam was crowned by Miss Mary Herron, "Miss Muskegon" of 1958. Last year's title-holder thanked Muskegon for the opportunity her reign has given her; studying piano in Chicago with the scholarship she won. The talented pianist performed from the works of Chopin in

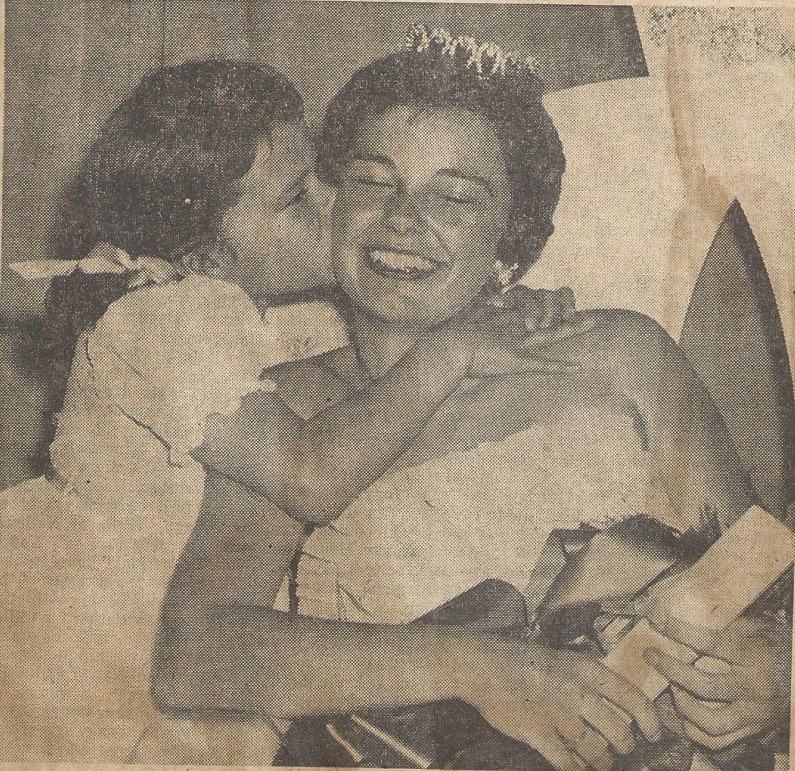
her closing appearance as reigning queen.
