Business Woman of the Year is named

Eight years ago, she made history as the first woman to be elected to the office of Muskegon County Clerk.

Monday night, she made history again. Margaret Greenwood became the 25th woman to be named Quadrangle Club's Business Woman of the Year. She took time out from her 1980 political campaign to attend the club's annual dinner celebrating National Business Women's Week at the Masonic Temple — and walked away with the group's top honor.

MRS. GREENWOOD, a past president and secretary of Quadrangle Business and Professional

Club, didn't start her career as a politician. She was a cost estimator at Teledyne Continental Motors Corp. for nearly 26 years before being elected County Clerk.

Mrs. Greenwood shared the limelight Monday night with Philip J. Gannon, Ph.D., president of Lansing Community College. Gannon spoke about "The Professional — A Commitment for the 80s."

Mrs. Greenwood's involvement in the community and her volunteer work certainly must have impressed the panel of judges which consisted of Lowell Kinney, public relations officer for General Telephone Co.; Ausma Lanka, publish-

er of The Norton Examiner; and David Walburn, secretary-treasurer of Westran Corp.

THE NEW Business Woman of the Year is president of Hackley Heritage Association; a board member of Every Woman's Place Inc.; a member of Women's Organizational Council; and a member of the Michigan Association of County Clerks and the United County Officers Association of Michigan.

In 1979, Mrs. Greenwood was recognized for community service in promoting Americanism by the Ladies Auxiliary, Lt. Wilbur Boyer

Post. In 1972, she earned a special tribute from Gov. William Milliken as "participant of the month" of the Muskegon Department of Community Development.

AND IN 1974-75, Mrs. Greenwood was honored by the state Business and Professional Women's Club for her "exceptional contribution in community and government service."

She has done volunteer work for the United Way, been president of the Americanization Council, been a member of the Muskegon Resource Council and in 1970 was one of the participants representing the

City of Muskegon in the All-America Cities contest in Portland, Ore. She has also been a member of the local committee of the Michigan Statewide Institute on Community Relations and Administration of Justice.

BUT BEYOND her identity as a volunteer and participant in community activities, Mrs. Greenwood is best known around the county building as the lady with all the elephants. Hers is a favorite office to visit because she has on display dozens of elephant figurines — the symbol of the Republican party she represents.
